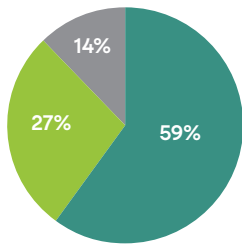

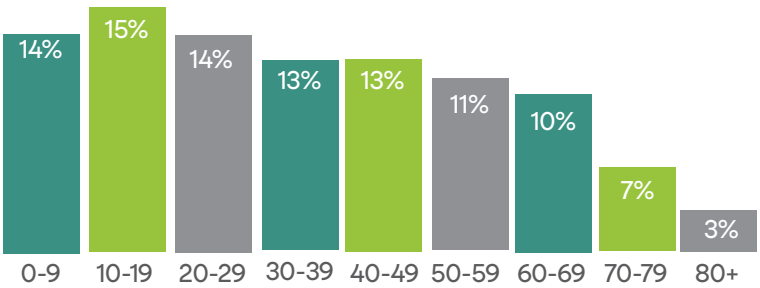


Population by Age Category

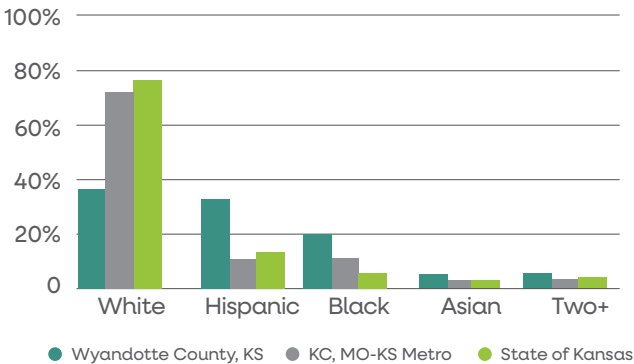

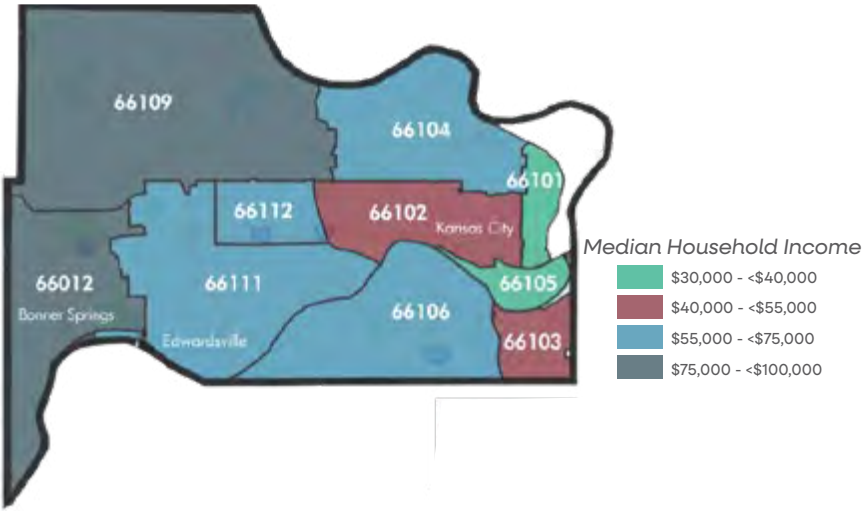

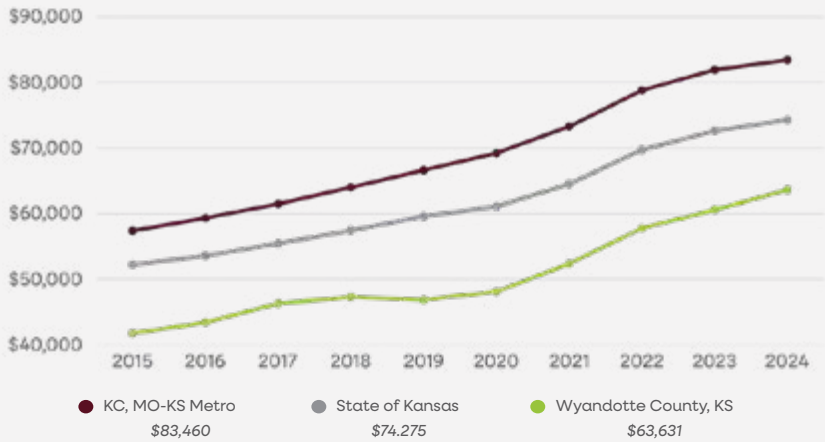

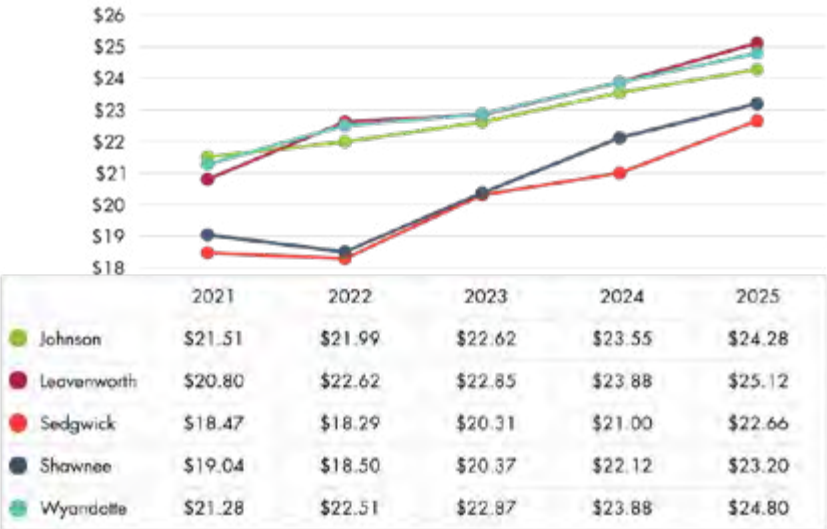
MEDIAN HOUSEHOLD INCOME COMPARISON



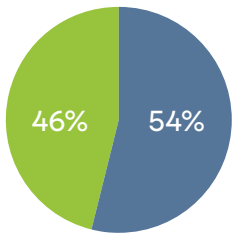

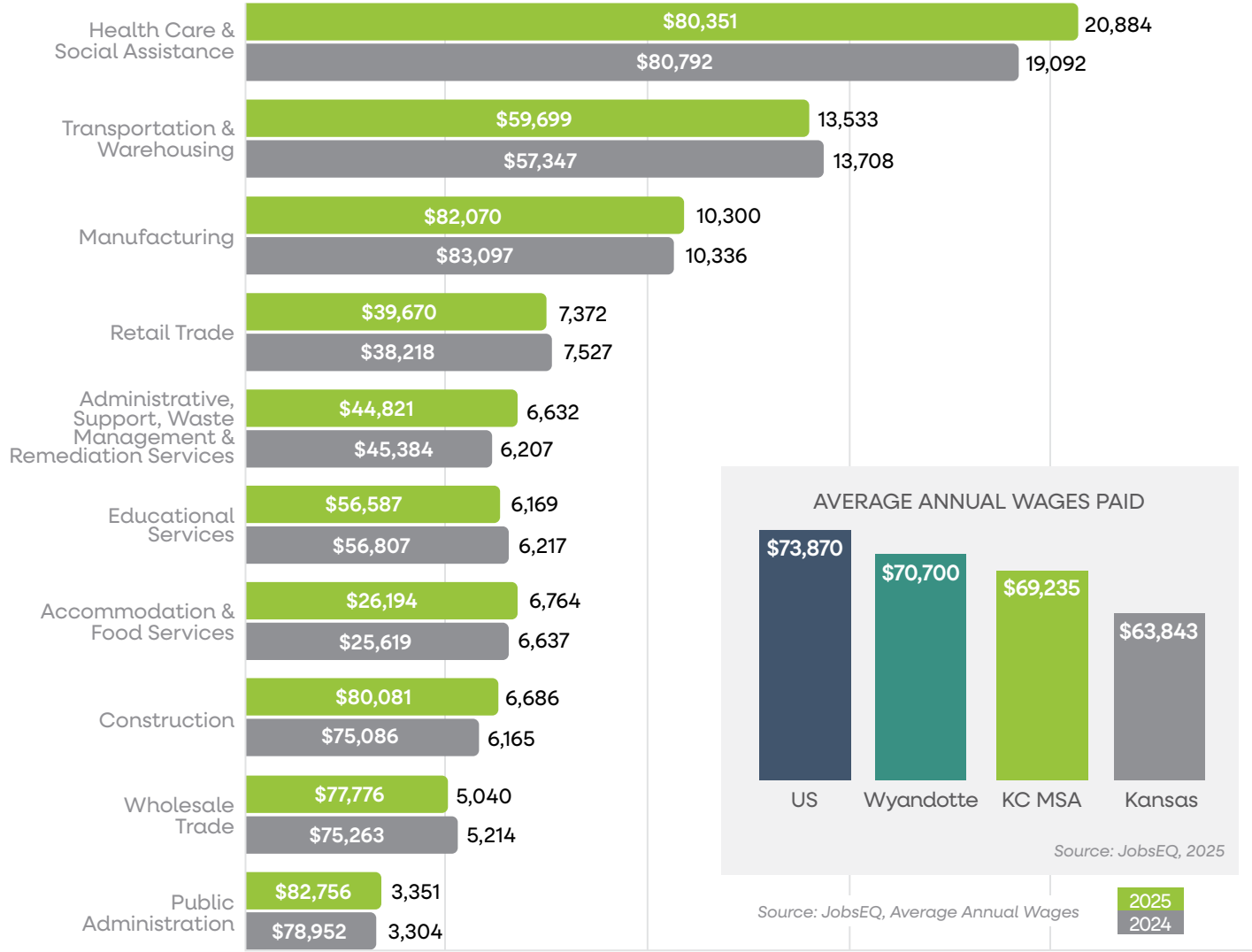

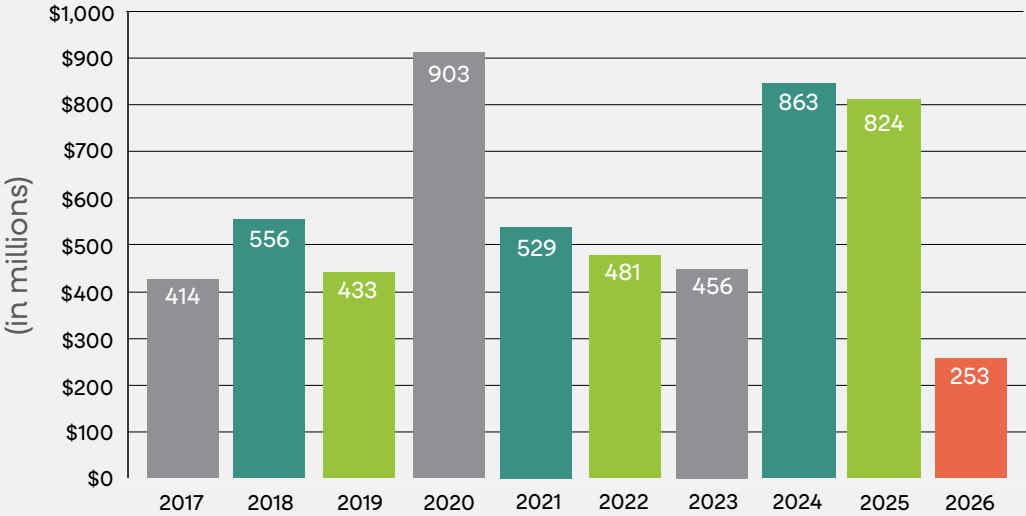

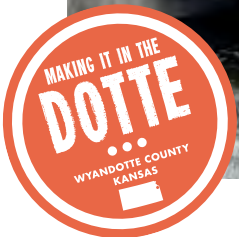
During the first quarter of 2026, Wyandotte County had an average of **5,010 available jobs** with an average wage of **\$60,644/year**.

Career Pathways Student Tours

With support from the Unified Government Public Health Department's Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP), WYEDC partnered with Kansas Workforce Partnership, Kansas City Kansas Community College (KCKCC), and Kansas Manufacturing Solutions to offer Career Pathways Student Tours during the 2025–2026 school year. All 10 Wyandotte County high schools participated, with 367 students visiting 24 businesses through 18 tours and learning firsthand about local careers and training opportunities, including KCKCC's FAME program and Industrial Maintenance Labs. KCKCC also awarded 18 scholarships totaling \$9,000 to support students' education and training goals. These experiences build confidence, spark interest, and strengthen the local talent pipeline
